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



Rams Hunt Down Lynx

Basketball scrimmage ends with unexpected results

The Anoka-Ramsey Community College Golden Rams' women's basketball team defeated the Minnesota Lynx 81-79 at the Target Center last night. The Rams were invited to play following some major departures from the Lynx roster.

With the absence of Maya Moore for the 2019 season and Lindsay Whalen retiring from play, the Lynx offered to play the Rams as a warm-up. Lynx head coach Cheryl Reeve said she thought playing one of the finalists in the regional college tourney would not be a major challenge for the team. The resulting loss became a wake-up call to Reeve.

"I didn't think it would be this bad," Reeve said.

Moore was the team's top scorer last season, with an average 18 PPG. The four-time WNBA champion announced on Feb. 5 that she would be sitting out the 2019 season to pursue her interests outside the court, focusing on her family and ministry endeavors.

Whalen retired from active competition while transitioning into a head coaching role for the women's team at the University of Minnesota, where she played in college. She had no previous coaching experience, but her eight championship titles and four gold medals were enough of a letter of intent for the U.

As Whalen and Moore stepped out, Rams players Charo Nickens and Mikayla Homola became the standout players of the game. The duo had field goal percentages of 66.3 and 42.4 respectively. Nickens and Homola outperformed the former star players of the Lynx at their own game.

The two teams agreed to a second game in the fall, but the exact date was not set at this point. The Lynx said they wanted to have the tables turned, when the Rams would have a new team at the beginning of its season.
