





HALLOWEEN: A HISTORY

The leaves are changing color, carved pumpkins are being placed on every doorstep, and an employee from Spirit Halloween stands on a corner in a werewolf costume. That's right, it's Halloween.

Halloween, or All Hallows' Eve is observed on the 31st of October, has its roots in multiple cultures as far back as the ancient Celtic tribes who observed it as a harvesting festival by the name of Samhain.

So where do the candy and costumes enter the picture? Halloween has changed quite a bit in the time its been around, from Gaelic origins to a reimagining by Christianity, all the way down to slasher films and trick or treating.


table. I felt a chill run up my back."




